At 10:30, nothing is left of the two towers that once proudly stood in New York City. Resulting from the apparent terrorist attack is chaos all across America. Then, approximately 10 years later, Navy SEALS bravely enter the building that housed the terrorist who planned the most brutal attack on American soil. When the man was captured, Americans experienced a sense of pride about their country; there was, and still is, such a strong sense of unity in every American after that life changing event. After months of being away from home on that operation, Navy SEALS returned home, and neither them nor their families could hold back tears of joy.
